We felt that it was important to use the Coronation to explore the history of Britain, the Commonwealth and also British values. In the afternoon, children took part in street parties outside, had a drink and a snack and each class was invited to a drumming workshop in the hall to bring a carnival atmosphere to our afternoon. The day finished with classes reading Coronation themed read at three books, these included 'The Boy who would be King' by Michael Morpurgo and the non-fiction DK book 'King Charles III: Celebrating His Majesty's Coronation and Reign'.
